An invitation is extended to all interested persons to attend. The official representatives from Heritage Ottawa will be Diane Holmes and Jennifer Roddick.

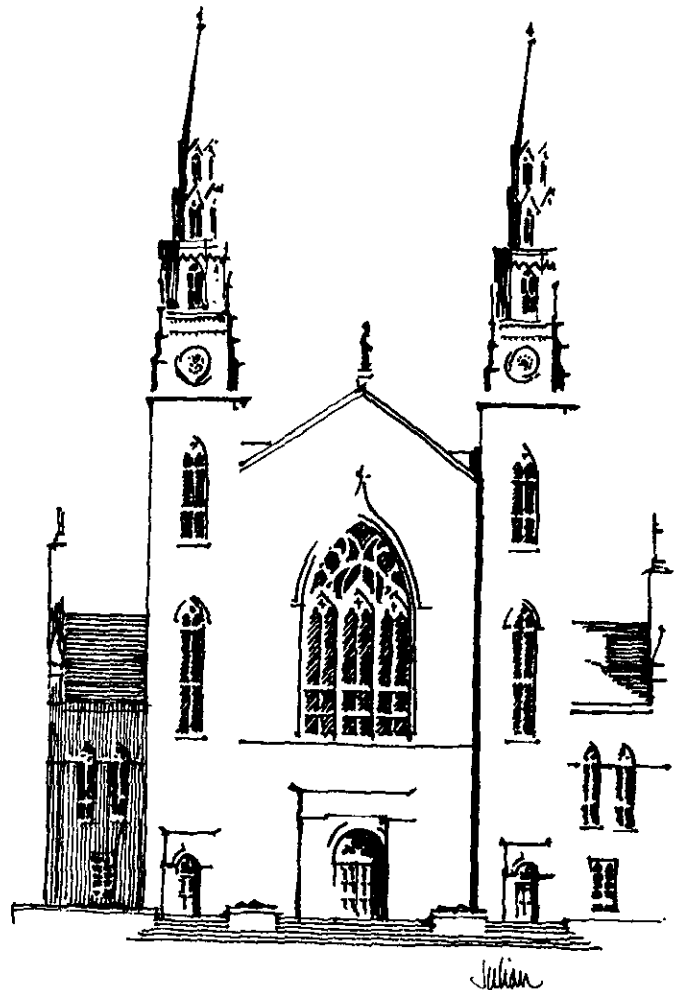

BOARD HIGHLIGHTS

"Board Highlights", which will be a regular feature of the Newsletter, is aimed at keeping the members of Heritage Ottawa informed of the decisions taken and the ideas discussed at the monthly Board meetings.

Following is a summary of the most recent meeting held at the Fraser Schoolhouse on April 1.

The Publications Committee was authorized to spend a maximum of \$500.00 to produce 5,000 copies of a membership brochure available for general distribution at the Schoolhouse and at public functions.

There was a lengthy discussion of the possible renovation of the Schoolhouse as designed by Gerry White and Julian Smith of the Building Committee. Suggested renovations, which could take up to two years to complete, include an extended gallery and kitchenette on the ground floor, storage space, two bathrooms and a meeting area on the second floor. Exterior changes would be the addition of two dormers and a porch. The cost of these renovations could be shared with the NCC who own the building. It was suggested that a Heritage Ottawa Award of Merit be presented at the Annual General Meeting, May 27th, to Clifford Ham, City of Ottawa Heritage Planner, in recognition of his work for the cause of heritage in Canada's capital.

Diane Holmes and Jennifer Roddick agreed to represent Heritage Ottawa at the regional meeting of Eastern Ontario and Western Quebec historical societies to be held May 10 at St. Lawrence College in Cornwall.

BOARD MEMBER PROFILE

Gerry White

Gerry was born in the early forties in Toronto where his family had a traditional farming background. His education started there and finished up in the more rural Markham from whence he graduated.

After a short period of indecision he enlisted in the RCMP and, after a year of training in Ottawa, he spent some three years as a honorary Newfie.

When Gerry decided to return to the halls of academia he enrolled in the Architectural Technology course at Ryerson Polytechnical Institute graduating in 1969. He was employed by Bregman and Hamann, one of the largest firms of architects in Canada, before joining the staff of the Architecture Department, Algonquin College in 1973.

Gerry is presently an instructor in the Restoration and Rehabilitation Program, Department of Architecture at Algonquin, and in this capacity he has been closely involved in the formulation of a course in restoration and rehabilitation which is offered to the students as a third-year option. Gerry is convinced that we must educate ourselves in the art, the science and the craft of making the most and the best of what we have in terms of our already-built environment.

He believes that our diminishing heritage resources require much more rigorous management and protection in order that the essence of our architectural and cultural traditions are maintained for the future. He also believes that public education is one route by which a better understanding and appreciation of our heritage can be stimulated. To this end, he is presently planning to offer an evening lecture series on the History of Building Technology in Canada through Algonquin College this fall.

During his past six years with the College, Gerry has involved himself with related extra-curricular work. With a group of students, he worked to relocate and restore log houses for private use. At another time, he supervised the study of architectural detailing of stone residences in the Rideau Valley; houses thought to have been constructed by the masons involved with the building of the canal.

His involvement in the field of Architectural Conservation has found him in many areas of activity, including community related projects involving his students in the historical research and recording of several local landmarks, for example, St. Andrews Church Hall, The Pinhey Estate and The Billings Estate. He has participated

in public lectures on the Architecture of the Ottawa and Rideau Valleys and Rehabilitation seminars for home-owners. He presently serves on the Centretown Heritage Committee and has served as Board Member of Heritage Ottawa for the past five years. He is also Chairman of the Building Committee of the Heritage Ottawa Schoolhouse Gallery.

Of significant interest is that Gerry was licensed by the Ontario Government, last summer, to investigate, from an archeological point of view, the site of the "Heritage House" in Smiths Falls. A report will be published next spring. Gerry feels quite strongly that before a restoration program is initiated, this kind of investigation must be carried out to discover as much as possible about the original place or building, how it was used and by whom. If this is not done the restoration work itself may well eradicate or hide from us, artifacts and other evidence of its original life.

Recently married, Gerry is grateful to his wife, Nicole, for her understanding and assistance to him in his current research work.
