The history of building in Canada will be the topic of a 15-week lecture series beginning the 14 January 1981.

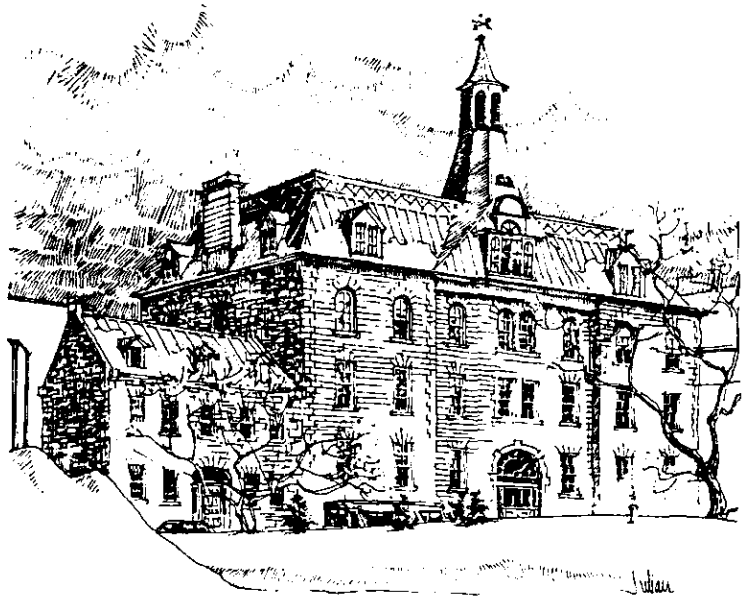
The course will study forms and techniques of construction introduced to Canada beginning in the 17th Century and the development of these and new forms, materials and techniques of building through to the 20th Century.

The course will also discuss the evolution and use of tools and traditional building crafts, architectural design traditions and their association with the variety of building types and materials.

growing quantity of material being published today. However, in Ottawa there has been very limited access to architectural publications.

The Architecture Book Store is run by Robert Froom and Anthony Leaning, both recently graduated from the School of Architecture, Carleton University. The idea for this project started when both studied one year at the Architectural Association in London. Subsequently, Robert worked on the Architectural Design Magazine in London.

The book store, located at 116 Third Avenue in The Glebe, has a large selection of recently published books on the history and theory of Architecture and urban design, as well as many classic titles that have not, to date, been available in Ottawa. There are monographs on influential contemporary architects, as well as books on building construction, construction, space standards, design for renewable energy, and advice for the amateur builder and renovator. The regular selection of international magazines is supplemented by a few new and less well-known periodicals and catalogues.

As well as its bookselling component, the store has a small gallery to exhibit the works of local architects and designers.
