## ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Annual General Meeting held May 25th provided members with an inside look at plans for the Rideau Canal 150th Anniversary Celebrations. Bob Haig, Parks Canada representative and past-Director, Heritage Ottawa, disclosed some of the plans at a talk and slide presentation punctuated with history and amusing anecdotes of life on the Canal since its construction.

We thank Mr. Haig for his enlightening talk and look forward to participating ourselves in the celebrations.

Prior to the presentation elections of the Board of Directors were held. We extend a warm welcome to new Board Members Barry Padolsky, well-known Ottawa architect, Janice Sutton, whose articles have enhanced the Newsletter greatly over the past year, and Harold Kalman who has joined the Board for a second term in an ex-officio capacity and who represents Heritage Ottawa on the LACACCommittee.

Diane Holmes was subsequently elected by the new Board as President. Bill Keenan will continue as Treasurer and our most valuable Stella Kirk as Executive Secretary.

The new Board brings with it a multitude of bright new ideas. Volunteers are needed to help fulfil those ideas. Heritage Ottawa has been involved in a great many activities this past year. Retiring President John Leaning presented those attending the Annual General Meeting with just a few; namely: the publication of "The Domestic Heritage of Ottawa" and walking tours of the City; representation on Local Council of Women, LACAC and Cartier Square Advisory Committee; support for Heritage Winnipeg's efforts to amend the Income Tax Act to be more favorable towards Heritage Conservation; contribution towards saving the First Avenue Public School from demolition; tours of the Nicholas Street Jail and the East Block; together with other organizations Heritage Ottawa organized a 10-week seminar on Residential Heritage Restoration Certificates of Merit were presented to St. John Ambulance for their restoration of 312 Laurier Avenue, George Wilkes for the restoration of 112 Daly Avenue, and Clifford Ham, Heritage Planner for the City of Ottawa for his contribution towards preservation of our heritage during his employment at City Hall.

#### "COVERED BRIDGES"

Dr. Robert Forget's splendid photo exhibit of covered bridges in Eastern Canada continues at the Schoolhouse Gallery, 62 John Street.

If you haven't already seen the exhibit, a visit is well worthwhile as the unique photos give one a chance to linger over a view of Canada's past which is often overlooked in the course of a journey.
