

June 20th marks the centennial of this institution. Members of the "burgh" interested in helping out, please contact Eleanor Polk or Gladys Blair.


FRASER SCHOOLHOUSE

CHAUDIERE FALLS STUDY


Heritage Ottawa will be a sponsor of an archeological study of the Chaudiere Falls area. David Bouse will be the supervisor of the project. Martin will give details at the May 26 meeting.

INCORPORATION

Heritage Ottawa became incorporated as of April 17 1975. This makes the name Heritage Ottawa official and we will no longer be known as the Heritage Committee. Audrey Crook is presently working very hard to update our membership literature which still refers to us as the Heritage Committee.

187--RIDEAU STREET

The commercial structure at 187 Rideau was recently damaged by fire. The owners have applied for a demolition permit which will be granted unless City Council passes a 90-day stay of demolition. This "stay of demolition" does not guarantee the saving of the structure but it would give us time to study and propose alternatives to the destruction of one of Rideau Street's last stone façades. If you feel strongly about saving this building let your municipal representative hear about it.



ONTARIO HERITAGE ACT

First the good news-----

The listing of heritage properties is made a municipal responsibility.

Then the bad-----

Unless the municipality is willing to purchase the property, it can be demolished after 270 days.

Heritage Canada has prepared a brief on this legislation, outlining its pros and cons. This is available on request.

Heritage Ottawa has set up a committee under Ted MacDonald to study the legislation.


